







Gait in a case of chronic myelitis. From instantaneous serial photographs of a patient of Dr. Dercum, by Muybridge.





# GOALS OF MEDICINE




### Medical knowledge

	Certain	Uncertain
Agreed	A Disease and (often) illness: diagnosed - treated, cured or managed (e.g. cancer).	B 'At risk' of disease, may or may not experience illness - risk factors rooted in probability treated, managed or cured (e.g. obesity)
Consent	C Healthy: no illness, no disease: may be encouraged to subject body to monitoring and assessment	D Illness and no disease – no diagnosis, assessment but limited treatment, management or cure

How has mental health been situated in your chronic illness experience?




### Influence of Identity
